Peter Galvin Wins Lombardi Award

A cross-country season already rich in recognition produced one more honor for Mc-Quaid Jesuit's standout runner last week. Senior Peter Glavin became the 10th recipient of the Vince Lombardi Memorial Plaque at the school's crosscountry awards dinner.

The Lombardi award goes to the runner "who in the judgement of his coaches and teammates best exemplifies the devotion to his faith, his sport, and his team that marked the greatness of Vince Lombardi."

On hand to see Glavin receive the plaque were former winners John Hurley ('71), Kevin Burnett ('74), and Tom

Glavin, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Glavin, 170 Maywood Ave., Pittsford, also received a plaque noting the school records he will leave behind in the 3 mile and 5000 meters cross-country events. He set the latter mark in his final race, placing seventh in the State Federation meet at Saratoga while running 16:17.


Bradley thinks that Glavin will do even better in college at (Continued on Page 7)
