

Rich in Tradition

Corcoran, F-M boys to test unbeaten records

With the trio of Larry Petry, Ryan Hohm and Ben Murphy leading the way, underdog Corcoran (4-0) seeks to upset unbeaten Fayetteville-Manlius (4-0) when the two Onondaga League Class A rivals tangle today at F-M. Though the Hornets are state-ranked and defending Section Three Class A champions, the Cougars plan to give favored F-M a serious test.

Last fall, F-M and host Corcoran raced to a 29-29 tie in their dual meet. F-M won only because its sixth runner finished ahead of Corcoran's sixth runner.

Even if the Cougars lose, it's a tribute to coach John Hohm that the undermanned Cougars are strong enough to challenge the Hornets. Having enough runners to field both a varsity and junior varsity team is an annual challenge for Hohm, who, in his 27th year as coach, is working with a 12-man team this season.

"I'd rather have about 20 guys to choose a starting (7-man) team from, but it's difficult to get that many kids to make that serious a commitment to running at a city school," said Hohm, a 1967 graduate of Nottingham. "It's not easy to persuade kids these days to run six to seven miles per day, or as much as 50 miles per week. Not many kids these days want to train that hard. The better teams we run against usually have twice as many guys on their roster as we do.'

Despite a constant lack of numbers, the 51-year-old Hohm has led Corcoran to sectional titles and five state titles – a Class A state crown in 1979, and Class B state titles in 1986, '90, '92 and '93.

Pacing those Cougar teams to state crowns were Craig Kinney in 1979, Eric Welling and Joe Serrao ('86), Pat Van Boden ('90), and Ryan Davis and Dan McSherry ('92 and '93).

Serrao is now the coach of the improving Corcoran girls cross country team.

Hohm, a lifelong running fanatic who has competed in 25 marathons, is proud of his squads. However, he just might be fondest of his 1981 team. That squad, led by Steve Loretz, finished first with low score of 81 points at the Class A state meet, which was held during a snowstorm in Malone. Loretz won the race.

However, moments after the race, Loretz was disqualified for accidentally cutting about 30 meters off the course.

"Steve couldn't see the trail, because it was snowing so hard," Hohm said. "Since he won the race by nearly 100 meters, there's no way he should have been disqualified. We clearly had the best team in the race that day."

However, runner-up Rochester McQuaid won the trophy instead of Corcoran. It was an unpopular decision.

On the Monday following that meet, McQuaid captain Mike Das gathered his runners for a team meeting. There, McQuaid voted to send the state title plaque to Corcoran. McQuaid added an engraved plate to the plaque which read: "Corcoran 81, McQuaid 101. Congratula-tions on a great race." McQuaid coach Bob Bradley mailed the plaque to Hohm at Corcoran. Today, that 1981 state title trophy occupies a place of honor in the Corcoran trophy case.

"I've never seen anything in high school sports to match the sportsmanship that McQuaid showed in 1981," Hohm said. "Their coach, Bob Bradley, is one of the finest track and cross country coaches I've ever known. He, along with guys like Jerry Riordan (CBA, Henninger) and (the late) George Constantino (Nottingham) are probably the three guys I learned the most from in my career.

So, technically, Hohm's teams have won six state titles. But that won't help Corcoran defeat F-M today. What will
