□ The McQuaid cross-country team took third in Saturday's Loyal Greenman Invitational in Binghamton. The Knights had 80 points to finish behind Ithaca (51) and Binghamton (70).

□ **CROSS COUNTRY:** McQuaid, with its senior trio of Brian Rapp, Jean-Pierre Lavallee and Rennie Brimstein, is favored to defend its Section 5 team title tomorrow at 1:30 p.m. at CCFL in Canandaigua.

The Knights' toughest competition in Class A should come from County champion Churchville-Chili and Aquinas, which has lost twice to McQuaid recently, in a dual-meet and the City-Catholic League championships.

In the boys Class A individual race, Brockport's Tim Letouzel rates as the favorite. He should be pressed by House, Dan Fernandez of Greece Athena and Mike Oberholzer of Greece Olympia.

Brighton sophomore Jodie Dushay hasn't lost to a Section 5 opponent this year and is the favorite in the girls' race. Fairport, Spencerport and Irondequoit should battle for the Class A girls' team title.

□ **FINISHING KICK:** Brockport's Tim Letouzel ran the race he planned in winning Saturday's Monroe County League individual title. The senior finished the 5,000 meter (3.1 mile) Mendon Ponds course in 15:42 as Greg House of team champion Churchville-Chili was second in 15:46 and Greece Athena's Dan Fernandez was third in 15:50.

Letouzel was 15th at the mile mark, moved up with the leaders shortly thereafter and sprinted away from House with about 600 yards left.

"I was a little surprised the front runners went out at a comfortable pace," said Letouzel, whose only loss in County competition was to House in a league meet. "I knew I'd be strong at the end. I figured I'd be able to kick."

Although Brockport has had several championship teams in the last 15 years under Coach John Izzo, Letouzel became the school's first champion in the County meet.

"He's a tenacious kid," Izzo said. "We figure that if he gets out shoulder-to-shoulder with somebody at the end, he's got a good chance to win,

basically because of his fierceness. He'd go through anything to win."

The hilly Mendon Ponds course isn't Letouzel's favorite. He prefers flatter courses, like the one at Community College of the Finger Lakes, the site of Saturday's Section 5 meet.

"I don't consider myself a good hill runner," he said. "A big, flat course should be to my advantage."

"The (Section 5) race should be a dogfight. I'm confident. I'm happy with my training. I feel I'm in the best shape I've ever been in."

□ **CROSS COUNTRY:** Over the last few years, Coach Gary Boyce and the seniors on the Churchville-Chili cross-country team have gone on a lot of training runs together. Yesterday the coach and runners met at Churchville Park and took off on a 45-minute run, over flat terrain and at a nice-and-easy pace.

This wasn't a training session, just a chance to talk over the events of last Saturday and to make plans for next Saturday.

The Saints knocked off favorite and defending champion McQuaid Saturday to win the Section 5 Class A title at the Community College of the Finger Lakes. The Saints had 51 points to runner-up McQuaid's 105.

"They didn't win it because we had a bad day," said McQuaid Coach Bob Bradley. "They just went out and won it. They beat us up front and beat us in the back. They just ran a very solid race."

The Saints' top three runners cracked the top-10 as Greg House, Andy Coots and Steve Stellwagen finished second, third and seventh. Mark Richardson finished 14th, right behind McQuaid's top-finisher Brian Rapp, and Glen Hewitt was 25th.

"Mark and Glen knew they were the keys," House said. "They knew they had to beat McQuaid's fifth man. They did a great job. Mark had probably the best performance of his life. I think he won it for us."

"We've been waiting for this ever since freshman year. We all started running together in junior high. This is the year we've been training for."

House almost had a double victory, but he was beaten out by 6.6 seconds for first place by Brockport's Tim Letouzel, who finished the 5,000-meter course in 16:03.6, the day's fastest time. House beat Letouzel in a dual meet but Letouzel beat House in the Monroe County meet two weekends ago.

Both Letouzel and the Saints qualified for the state inter-sectional meet, which will be held at CCFL on Saturday.

"I give them a good chance to win the A Division," Bradley said.

Brockport's LeTouzel outruns field

Brighton's Dushay first for girls in Sec. 5 meet

Brockport's Tim LeTouzel spoke quickly, precisely and matter-of-factly yesterday as he described the 5,000-meter course he had just run at the Community College of the Finger Lakes. He described it exactly the way he had attacked it to win the Class AA boys' Section 5 cross-country title.

"All week long I've been thinking the race through and thinking the course through," said LeTouzel, a senior. "I tried to calculate where I would be strongest and where the competition would be strongest."

With that perfectly planned approach, it's no wonder LeTouzel covered the course in 16:03.6, the fastest time of any class on a windy, cold day.

The Class AA team title, however, went

to Churchville-Chili with 51 points, far outdistancing defending champion McQuaid with 105. The Saints placed three runners in the top 10 individually. They were Greg House, who came in second and behind LeTouzel in 16:09.9; Andy Coots, third, in 16:10.5; and Steve Stellwager, seventh, in 16:47.1.

Brighton's Jody Dushay was the girls' Class A overall winner in 18:58.1 as she sprinted the last 200 meters to overtake Webster's Erika Schwarz, who finished second in 19:05.2.

Irondequoit took the girls Class A title for the third year in a row, with 78 points. Paula Chiesa was sixth in 20:03 and Chris Dudeck ninth in 20:11 for the Indians. Pittsford Sutherland won the boys' Class A team title with 79 points. Dansville's Gary Redding was the individual winner in 16:25.1.

The winning team plus the top four individuals in each class advance to the state meet Saturday, also at CCFL.

LeTouzel, who won the individual title last week at the Monroe County Champi-

onships, turned out to be strongest exactly where he thought — over the last 2,000 meters.

"I knew I'd be strong over the last 1½ miles," said LeTouzel who took the lead at that point. "All I had to do was hang on to the leaders and keep the race in control."

"House has a tendency to put an extra effort up the hills. I knew if I could stay with him along the top of the ridge and the downhill, I'd catch him. Downhill I got everything back and opened up the lead."

"I'm happy I've done this well," LeTouzel said. "I know I'd be a contender because of the way I've been trained by Coach (John) Izzo. At the beginning of the season I don't do speed work. I waited until I was ready."

This is the first year Brockport has competed in Class AA. The Blue Devils won the Class A team title last year and came in third yesterday. In Class A last year, LeTouzel was 13th.

Like LeTouzel, Dushay ran her race, al-

though Schwarz did her best to upset her. Dushay, who is undefeated in Section 5 competition this season, and Schwarz have met three times this year with Dushay winning all three.

Part of the reason, again, has to do with the differences in strength. Dushay proved she has the better finishing kick.

"The race went exactly the way it was supposed to go," said Brighton Coach Dave McLaughlin. "It came down to whether or not Erika could hold her off at the end of the race."

"Erika was much closer to her today than before," said Webster Coach Jim May. "Jody is very fast. Erika is not fast but very strong. At the counties she took the race out very fast hoping to destroy her (Dushay's) game plan."

Following that strategy again, May said he knew Schwarz had to have the lead but it wasn't big enough to hold off Dushay.

"She's got more experience," said McLaughlin of Dushay. "Schwarz is an eighth-grader. After all, Jody ran against Anita Kelly."

McQuaid runners surprise Bradley

Coach Bob Bradley and the McQuaid cross-country team seem to have this business of who's No. 1 in perspective.

Last fall, you'll recall, McQuaid shipped the championship trophy it won at the state meet to the team at Syracuse Corcoran High School. Although McQuaid was the official winner, the team considered the true champion to be Corcoran, which lost the title when its top runner was disqualified on a controversial decision.

This week McQuaid is ranked No. 1 in the New York State Sports Writers Association poll, but Bradley isn't getting carried away, calling early season polls "pure speculation."

The Knights aren't ranked No. 1 simply because they're good sports. The team has performed well, winning the New Hartford and East Aurora invitations.

"I knew we'd have a good team but I didn't think we'd be quite this strong," Bradley says. "But we don't have the type team you expect to be No. 1. We don't have a Grant Whitney (former Penfield star and Cornell freshman) out in front."

In fact, Bradley isn't sure who is the No. 1 man. Senior Jean-Pierre Lavallee led the team at New Hartford and senior Brian Rapp was the top finisher at East Aurora. Senior Rennie Brimstein and sophomore Chris Lyboldt are also threats to run No. 1.

"It's all the more encouraging when you flip-flop like that," Bradley says. "Our strength this year will be grouping. We're going to be very deep. We've got eight kids who could be No. 5."

So, as usual, McQuaid will have a good team. But Bradley isn't about to claim the Knights are the state's best. He doesn't even consider the Knights a shoo-in for the Section 5 title — he thinks Aquinas will be a strong contender.

□ The first local cross-country invitational, The CCFL Challenge, will be hosted by Newark High on Saturday at Canandaigua's Community College of the Finger Lakes. Churchville, Aquinas to challenge hosts at McQuaid Invitational

Hot pursuit.

That's what Aquinas and Churchville-Chili have been giving McQuaid this year in high school cross country.

The Knights may be the best team in the state — though they slipped from No. 1 to No. 2 in this week's New York State Sports Writers Association poll — but Aquinas and Churchville-Chili are not far behind.

Aquinas was ranked No. 5 and Churchville-Chili No. 7 in this week's state poll.

"If last week is any indication, 121 to 123 to 124 (points) well, it's like sitting on one another's laps," said Coach Bob Bradley, now in his 21st season at McQuaid.

McQuaid edged runner-up Aquinas and third-place Churchville-Chili for the Division 1 team title Saturday at the CCFL 5-Kilometer Challenge in Canandaigua.

Greg House of Churchville-Chili was the top Section 5 finisher in that race, placing fourth. Also for Churchville-Chili, Andy Coots finished eighth and Steve Stellwagen was 15th.

Brian Rapp was McQuaid's top finisher, placing ninth. Len Fetterly of Aquinas finished 14th.

Rapp is one of the three "solid" seniors that lead McQuaid, according to Bradley. Jean Pierre Lavallee and Rennie Brimstein are the other two.

Lavallee was the second-place finisher when the Knights won their third straight New Hartford Invitational team title to open the season three weeks ago.

The fourth solid performer from McQuaid is sophomore Chris Lyboldt. Lyboldt finished ninth, while Rapp was placing fifth, as the Knights won their first East Aurora Invitational team title two weeks ago.

Rapp, Lavallee, Brimstein, Lyboldt and Frank McLaughlin will be the McQuaid runners charged with the responsibility of beating not only Churchville-Chili, but also teams like St. Michael's of Toronto, Bishop Hendricken of Warwick, R.I., and Walsh Jesuit of Chagrin Falls, Ohio, this weekend.

The Knights will be host to 138 schools from six states and Canada at the 18th annual McQuaid Invitational Saturday in Genesee Valley Park. About 3,500 runners are expected.

Bradley said St. Michael's is the team to beat among large schools.

"Of course, they were the team to beat last year," he said. "But most of last year's team is back and they had a strong junior varsity."

Bishop Hendricken won the AAA race last year, McQuaid finished second and St. Michael's was third.

"We're the home team, though, and we know the course," said Bradley. "That gives

us a shot at beating those other three (St. Michael's, Bishop Hendricken and Walsh Jesuit).

"When I say, 'We,' I mean Churchville as well as McQuaid, because they feel they are capable of beating us and they are."

Churchville-Chili's House, Miles Irish of Section 2's Burnt Hills, and sophomores Shannon Ritchie of Walsh Jesuit and Ron Markezich of Section 6's Williamsville North are the top runners in the 3 p.m. race.

Aquinas will run at noon in the AA race against defending champion East Aurora (No. 8 in the state), Benedictine of Cleveland, Section 3's Syracuse Christian Brothers Academy (No. 11 in the state), Section 10's Malone Franklin Academy (No. 6 in the state) and Brockport.

Individually, Aquinas' Fetterly, Bill McLaughlin of Section 6's East Aurora and Duane Galbi of Section 4's Maine-Endwell are the top runners.

"(Fetterly) is going to have his hands full," said Bradley. "But he always runs to his competition and he knows the course."

Penn Yan will be the top Section 5 team competing in the A race at 11:20 a.m., though Elmira Notre Dame of Section 4 and Easton, Pa., are the favorites.

In the girls' races, Lockport (AA) of Section 6 and Chardon, Ohio (A) will be back to defend respective titles. Chardon has won three straight team championships.

Mike Oberholzer of Greece Olympia is the top runner in the AAA race for unseeded schools, which starts at 2:15.

□ There will be over 135 schools and 3,500 cross-country runners in Saturday's 18th annual McQuaid Invitational. Races start at 10:30 a.m. and end at 3:30 at Genesee Valley Park.

Brockport's Tim LeTouzel psyches himself into becoming a cross-country winner.



'I tell myself that I'm willing to hurt'

Tim LeTouzel has won most of his cross-country races this fall by taking over the lead in the last 600 yards. But the Brockport High senior figures most of his races are won before getting to the starting line.

LeTouzel is a pre-race psyche artist in addition to being a stretch runner.

"Before races I tell myself I'm willing to hurt and that I'll go to any extreme to win," he says.

LeTouzel talked to himself before races last year, but the soliloquies weren't nearly as emotional.

"Last year I'd tell myself to go out and run hard," LeTouzel said, "and I'd hope for a good finish. This year I'm aggressive. Last year, I was happy to be up in front. This year I'm not happy unless I've won."

LeTouzel has been plenty happy. He's lost just once to an area runner — to Churchville-Chili's Greg House in a dual meet — and in the past two weekends has won the Monroe County League and Section 5 Class A individual championships.

"The big thing is that I'm mentally ready," LeTouzel says. "Last year, with 600 yards left in a race, I couldn't wait until the race was over. This year, with 600 yards left, I really want the race."

"In the big races, I've felt that people are trying to take the race from me. I've felt possessive about winning. I've felt a charge and have been able to use it positively."

"I'm mentally strong because I'm physically strong."

LeTouzel will be challenged tomorrow by the best runners in the state in the Class A intersectional meet at Community College of the Finger Lakes, the site of LeTouzel's Section 5 win last weekend.

"As far as I'm concerned, the pressure is off in this race," says LeTouzel, who was 21st in the state Class

I've wanted this season. I'm going to run controlled, relaxed and to the best of my ability, all of which should produce a good race."

LeTouzel's pre-race ritual includes more than mental preparation for an all-out physical effort. He also analyzes opponents and courses.

"The best thing he does in terms of racing is in executing the race plan," says Brockport Coach John Izzo. "I've had lots of good runners here but I've never had anyone execute the race plan as he does."

"He's not a front runner. If somebody opens up a lead on him early, it doesn't bother him. He's in complete control of his emotions. That's unusual in a high school kid."

Like any high school or world-class runner, LeTouzel can make a strategic error. He remembers last fall's Section 5 Class B race where he finished 13th.

"I knew I could finish in the top-3, but I didn't know how to handle the pressure," LeTouzel recalls, shaking his head. "I tried to win the race in the first mile. I wound up being hampered in the next two miles."

The 5-foot-6, 126-pound LeTouzel, whose blond hair makes him look like marathoner Bill Rodgers, would like to coach cross-country some day. But first he'll continue running in college. A B-student ranked in the top-third of his class, he's been contacted by several schools, including Syracuse, Colgate and Cornell, but hasn't begun to narrow his choices yet.

LeTouzel also runs track — his best mile time is 4:29 — but much prefers cross-country.

"Cross-country is the art of the sport," he says. "I run cross-country because I love it. You're thrilled if you win and you're in agony if you lose. But there's always satisfaction when you finish. All are factors in why

The Knights' toughest competition in Class A should come from County champion Churchville-Chili and Aquinas, which has lost twice to McQuaid recently, in a dual-meet and the City-Catholic League championships.

In the boys Class A individual race, Brockport's Tim Letouzel rates as the favorite. He should be pressed by House, Dan Fernandez of Greece Athena and Mike Oberholzer of Greece Olympia.

Brighton sophomore Jodie Dushay hasn't lost to a Section 5 opponent this year and is the favorite in the girls' race. Fairport, Spencerport and Irondequoit should battle for the Class A girls' team title.

□ **FINISHING KICK:** Brockport's Tim Letouzel ran the race he planned in winning Saturday's Monroe County League individual title. The senior finished the 5,000 meter (3.1 mile) Mendon Ponds course in 15:42 as Greg House of team champion Churchville-Chili was second in 15:46 and Greece Athena's Dan Fernandez was third in 15:50.

Letouzel was 15th at the mile mark, moved up with the leaders shortly thereafter and sprinted away from House with about 600 yards left.

"I was a little surprised the front runners went out at a comfortable pace," said Letouzel, whose only loss in County competition was to House in a league meet. "I knew I'd be strong at the end. I figured I'd be able to kick."

Although Brockport has had several championship teams in the last 15 years under Coach John Izzo, Letouzel became the school's first champion in the County meet.

"He's a tenacious kid," Izzo said. "We figure that if he gets out shoulder-to-shoulder with somebody at the end, he's got a good chance to win,

basically because of his fierceness. He'd go through anything to win."

The hilly Mendon Ponds course isn't Letouzel's favorite. He prefers flatter courses, like the one at Community College of the Finger Lakes, the site of Saturday's Section 5 meet.

"I don't consider myself a good hill runner," he said. "A big, flat course should be to my advantage."

"The (Section 5) race should be a dogfight. I'm confident. I'm happy with my training. I feel I'm in the best shape I've ever been in."

□ **CROSS COUNTRY:** Over the last few years, Coach Gary Boyce and the seniors on the Churchville-Chili cross-country team have gone on a lot of training runs together. Yesterday the coach and runners met at Churchville Park and took off on a 45-minute run, over flat terrain and at a nice-and-easy pace.

This wasn't a training session, just a chance to talk over the events of last Saturday and to make plans for next Saturday.

The Saints knocked off favorite and defending champion McQuaid Saturday to win the Section 5 Class A title at the Community College of the Finger Lakes. The Saints had 51 points to runner-up McQuaid's 105.

"They didn't win it because we had a bad day," said McQuaid Coach Bob Bradley. "They just went out and won it. They beat us up front and beat us in the back. They just ran a very solid race."

The Saints' top three runners cracked the top-10 as Greg House, Andy Coots and Steve Stellwagen finished second, third and seventh. Mark Richardson finished 14th, right behind McQuaid's top-finisher Brian Rapp, and Glen Hewitt was 25th.

"Mark and Glen knew they were the keys," House said. "They knew they had to beat McQuaid's fifth man. They did a great job. Mark had probably the best performance of his life. I think he won it for us."

"We've been waiting for this ever since freshman year. We all started running together in junior high. This is the year we've been training for."

House almost had a double victory, but he was beaten out by 6.6 seconds for first place by Brockport's Tim Letouzel, who finished the 5,000-meter course in 16:03.6, the day's fastest time. House beat Letouzel in a dual meet but Letouzel beat House in the Monroe County meet two weekends ago.

Both Letouzel and the Saints qualified for the state inter-sectional meet, which will be held at CCFL on Saturday.

"I give them a good chance to win the A Division," Bradley said.

□ The McQuaid cross-country team took third in Saturday's Loyal Greenman Invitational in Binghamton. The Knights had 80 points to finish behind Ithaca (51) and Binghamton (70).

McQuaid keeps streak alive

Knights beat Aquinas for 110th consecutive cross country victory

Shortly before yesterday's cross country meet against Aquinas, McQuaid Coach Bob Bradley called a team meeting. The main order of business was setting up a sweepstakes.

Bradley passed out strips of paper, and the runners guessed the score of the meet, complete with an order of finish for each team. Most were picking close scores.

An hour or so later, McQuaid took a 20-41 victory for its 110th straight victory in a City-Catholic League dual meet.

"It was surprising how one-sided it was," Bradley said.

IT WAS SUPPOSED to be a close meet and possibly McQuaid's first loss since 1971, against Aquinas.

"Every few years we get a tough challenge," Bradley said before the meet. "In 1977, we beat Kearney by three or four points and we beat Aquinas 28-30 in '75."

The suspense ended early. "I knew we were in trouble at the quarter-mile mark," said Aquinas Coach Tom Gigliotti. "The kids didn't get out well and I could sense there was a problem."

When the three-mile race at Cobbs Hill Park was over, McQuaid had taken first place, third, fourth and fifth with Brian Rapp (16:02), Jean-Pierre Lavallee (16:20), Rennie Brimstein (16:23) and Frank McLaughlin (16:24).

The only Aquinas runner to break into the McQuaid pack was second-place Steve Winter (16:10), who ran 44 seconds faster than his previous best time on the course.

BEFORE THE RACE, Gigliotti thought Len Fetterly and Pete Reed could finish 1-2 but Fetterly (16:55) wound up 11th and Reed (17:08) 14th. The No. 1 and 2 runners on the team for most of the year, they were No. 3 and 5 yesterday.

"I can't explain it," said Fetterly, whose training has been hampered with tendinitis in his lower leg. "This is frustrating. We had waited for this for a long time."

"We talked about what we had to do and I thought we were prepared well, but we didn't seem ready today. I don't have it together yet. I haven't been racing well so far."

Rapp's time was 10 seconds off the course record, set by ex-McQuaid runner Tom Warth last season, and 24 seconds better than Rapp's previous best.

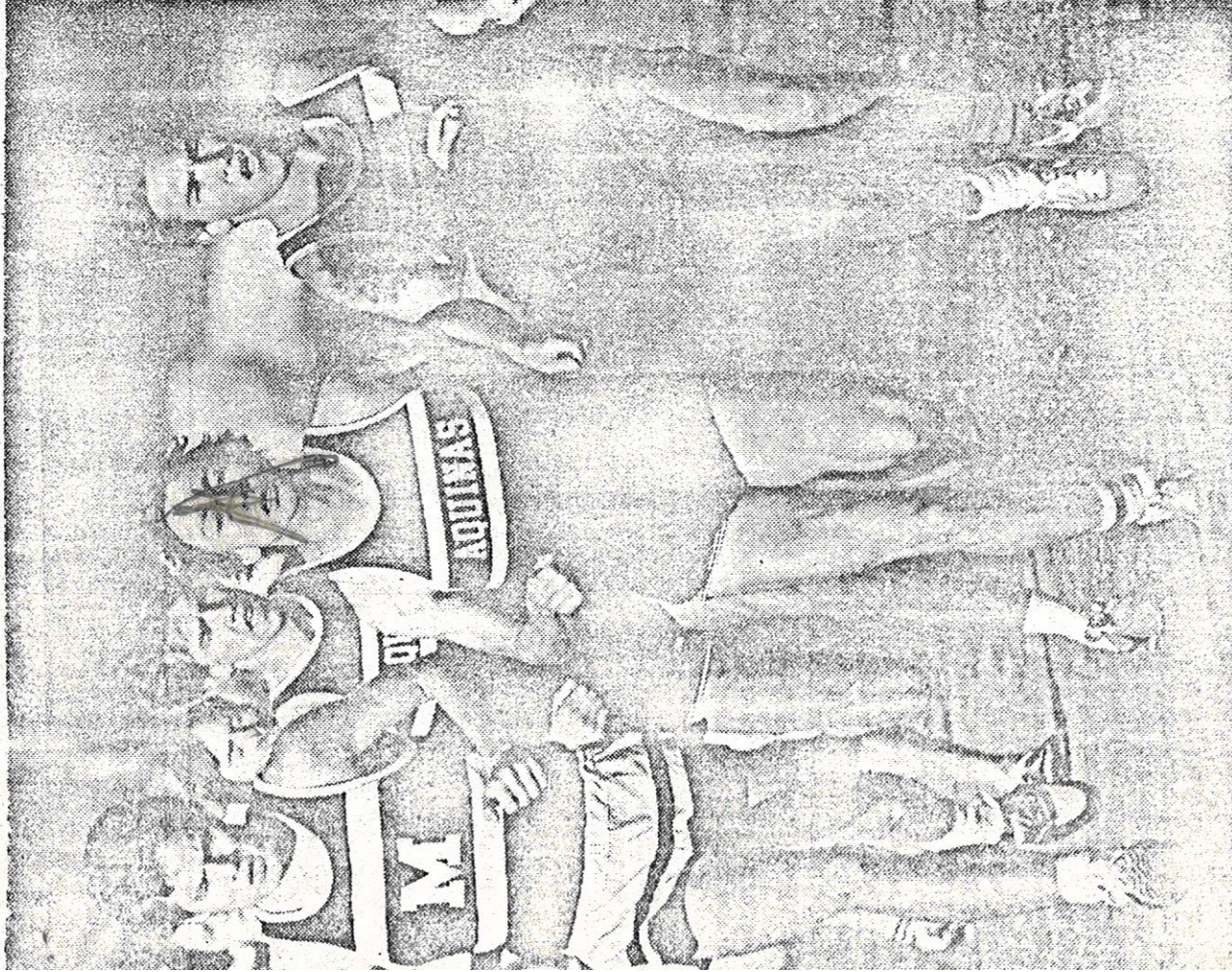
"I was surprised Winter ran so well today," said Rapp, who passed Winter and took the lead for good with three-quarters of a mile left. "And I was a little surprised Jean didn't beat me. He usually does well on this course and I usually have trouble. It's a mental thing."

WINTER FOUND little consolation in his breakthrough time, considering the loss.

"We still have sectionals," he said. "I think we can beat them if all of us are in top shape."

Oh, yes, about the sweepstakes. Tom McGrath — the winner of the Varsity B race — also won the pool, predicting a 20-40 score and listing McQuaid's first seven runners exactly.

His prize? A promise from Bradley to purchase from McGrath a \$5 book of tickets for the school raffle.

Churchville-Chili misses state Class A cross country title by 1 point

CANANDAIGUA — Churchville-Chili couldn't have come any closer to winning the state high school cross country championships yesterday.

One point meant the difference. Ithaca High School claimed the title and the Saints settled for second, but only after meet officials discovered an error in scoring and switched the position of two runners.

When the Saints had finished running the 5,000-meter championship course at the Community College of the Finger Lakes, they believed they had unofficially placed second in Class A, just a point behind Ithaca.

A short while later, unofficial word came from the scoring room that they actually had tied with Ithaca with 86 points. Since the position of the sixth runner is used to break ties, a Churchville-Chili runner was No. 6 and they figured they'd won.

Cheers went up among Saints' teammates who had moments earlier been prettily subdued as they ate lunch before the awards ceremony.

It wasn't to be. When the official results were posted, the Saints had finished second behind Ithaca by a point. It wasn't the sixth man, sophomore Bob King, who affected the outcome after all. It was an error in scoring the position of the No. 4

runners on the Churchville-Chili and Niagara Falls teams.

Churchville-Chili's Mark Richardson originally was listed ahead of Niagara Falls' Paul Gasparro. But a coach pointed out the correct finish and Richardson dropped from 60th to 61st.

The scoring was Ithaca 86, Churchville-Chili 87, Niagara Falls was third, another point back, at 88.

Last year's Class A title also was determined by a point. McQuaid triumphed with 96 points followed Section 11's Haupauge with 97. This year McQuaid finished second in the Sec. 5 meet and failed to qualify.

The Saints, however, did record the highest finish of the day among Section 5 schools. Irondequoit was seventh in girls' Class A; Pittsford Sutherland was eighth in boys' Class B; Waterloo was ninth in girls' Class B; South Seneca was sixth in boys' Class C; and Alexander was ninth in girls' Class C.

The fastest individual time of the day was turned in by Williamsville North's (Section 6) Ron Markezich. He won the boys' Class A title in 15:58. The top girls' time was Chris Curtin's 18:00 in the Class A race. She is from Mepham of Section 8. The best individual Section 5 times were recorded by Brighton's Jody Dushay in the girls' Class A race and Churchville-Chili's

Andy Coots. Dushay, a sophomore was 15th and covered the course in 19:36.

Coots was 13th overall in 16:40 followed in by teammate Greg House, 14th, in 16:45.

"I think we ran well overall," said House, a senior. "But not as well as last week."

Churchville's other finishers were Steve Stellwagen, 46th, 17:23; King, 75th, 18:00; and Jeff Carlson, 89th, 18:36. Only the top five scores contributed to the team score.

Tim LeFauvel, last week's Sec. 5 Class AA individual champion, finished 38th in 17:16.

Last week the Saints won their first Section 5 Class AA title on the same CCFL course. Yesterday was the third time they had done well on the course. They were third at the CCFL Invitational, behind McQuaid and Aquinas, early in the season.

Some pre-race "psyching" might have helped the Saints.

"There's this road sign by school and we all hit our heads on it last week," said Richardson.

The sign is a yellow and black street-direction arrow, McQuaid's colors. They figured their head-knocking bit of superstition helped win the sectionals over McQuaid last week, so they figured it might work again.

Yesterday the conditions of the course were poor because of a steady rain Friday which made the ground muddy throughout. Many of the teams that had hoped to run the course Friday were unable to do so. But that didn't seem to bother the Saints.

"We like sloppy weather," said Coots. "We wanted it to snow."

Dushay, who was spiked near the beginning of the race last year in a blizzard in Malone and was forced to withdraw, found the mud a problem.

"I wore spikes for the section meet and wore them today," said Dushay, who won the Section 5 Class AA title last week. "Not having spikes made a difference. Some of the people were falling down."

Dushay said she was pleased with her 15th place finish although she "wanted to be in the top 10."

"This week my pace was so much faster in the middle I had less energy left for my kick."

The top Section 5 finisher in girls' Class B was Honeoye Falls' Amy Edwards. She was 13th overall in 20:03. In Class C, Sodius' Julie Darling 26th in 21:13.

For boys' Class B, Gary Redding of Dansville was 18th in 16:55. In Class C, South Seneca's Jack Countway was 11th in 17:05.
