McQuaid sets scoring record, romps to title

Coach Bob Bradley figured five of his runners could finish in the top 10 in vesterday's Section 5 cross country championships.

But sweeping the first three places individually was a surprise.

McQuaid runners also finished sixth and eighth and the result was first place in the Class A team standings with 20 points. McQuaid will represent Section 5 in Saturday's state meet at Sunken Meadow State Park on Long Island.

record for boys, edging out Greece Arcadia's 21 in 1975. McQuaid has won nine team titles.

Junior Adam Reitz posted a winning time of 16 minutes, 47 seconds over a three-mile course at Stuart Park. Dan Lesser, also a junior, was second in 16:59 and Eric Garsin, a senior, was third in 17:13.

"I'm happy, but in pain," Reitz said as he sat in a car, trying to thaw out after running in below-freezing temperatures.

Late in the afternoon, the temperatures dropped, as did the chill

No wonder the cold was so biting. "We didn't wear tights. They're too restrictive," said Reitz, who was fourth last year.

Reitz and Lesser ran together most of the race. Lesser fell behind after 800 meters.

Seniors Tim Kelley, sixth in 17:21, and Matt Bunce, eighth in 17:24, added to McQuaid's strong performance. The Knights are No. 1 in the New York State Sports Writers Association ratings of Class A
