McQuaid cross country runners receive awards galore

The team honors retiring coach Bob Bradley.

The awards just kept coming at the recent McQuaid cross country dinner in the school cafeteria.

All of the 65 runners present received a certificate, of course, but there were over two dozen special awards as well. "We always give a lot, but this year there seemed to be more than ever," said coach Bob Bradley.

McQuaid's outstanding runner, junior Derek Seber, took home his second Best Index plaque, with a perfect 1.0 for leading his team in all 12 races. As a soph last year, Seber won with a 1.92. Seber was also recognized for having been named to the All-Section

5 boys team for his performance in the sectionals, where he placed third, and the state meet, where he was the second finisher of the 12 Section 5 Class A entries.

The school's three memorial awards went to two seniors and a freshman. Mike Ansaldi, the Knights' consistent No. 2 man, received the Vince Lombardi plaque for his all-around contributions to the team. Classmate Jeremy Krenzer was chosen for the Royden Smith plaque as Most Improved Runner.

Freshman Dominic Bozzelli, leader of McQuaid's unbeaten junior high team despite a late start, took home the Jeremy Abbott trophy for the second year.

Since improvement is the name of the game in running, there were five additional awards in that category.

Senior Jim Lappin, soph Brian Sparacino, and eighth-grader Aidan Rubery all won Most Improved trophies, while soph Connor McArthur and eighth-grader Sam Kernan were honored for being most improved during the season.

and it paid off. It wasn't just his times; it was the whole package- his running form, the way he competed, his contribution to the team spirit."


