## Hilton's Mullan aims for Top 10 at states

Hilton's Al Mullan says the hardest part about unning the 1,600 meters is getting by the two riddle laps.

"The key is how hard you concentrate," Mullan aid. "The last quarter is just a matter of a kick. The eal times come in the middle laps. That's where things become hard mentally.'

This spring, Mullan has survived all the tests, physical and mental. The Jacksonville Universitybound senior is unbeaten and is hoping to crack the Top 10 at the state track meet at Baldwinsville High near Syracuse today and tomorrow.

Mullan picked up where he left off last fall when he won the Section 5 Class A individual cross country title.

He went 8-0 in dual meets and won the 1,600 at invitationals at Geneseo and Brockport and the Monroe County Championships. The last two weekends, he won the Section 5 Class A meet and the Meet of Champions state qualifier by beating McQuaid's Steve Rapp in each race.

The Section 5 race was a classic. Mullan held a slight lead the entire race and just held off a lunging Rapp at the tape. His time of 4:20.7 is the area's best this year and about 15th best in

the state.
"He kept pushing me," said Mullan, who bettered his previous best time by five seconds. "I wasn't sure who had won. After I brought my time down that much, though, I set new goals for myself. I'd like to get into the teens in the state meet.'

Mullan ran 4:23.2 in the state qualifier, beating Rapp and McQuaid's Scott Paterson, two of the stars of the Knights' state champion cross

country team, by nearly four seconds.
"It was fun beating those guys," Mullan said. "They have so much talent."

So does Mullan.

After playing soccer his freshman year, he began distance running as a sophomore. His brother Rich, a 1976 Hilton graduate who went on to run at Roberts Wesleyan, was a big influence.
"Once I tasted some success," Al said, "I just

wanted to run more and more."

Mullan, a 5-11, 140-pounder, ran about 80 miles a week during the winter then got an early jump on the spring season when Hilton went to Jacksonville, Fla., to train over Easter break. It was there he met Jacksonville Coach Bill Fisher, a good friend of Hilton Coach Jim Shoemaker.

"We got in really good shape early," said Mullan, who had a bout with tendinitis that may have cost him a trip to the state meet last spring. "I've just tried to

maintain that over the season.' Mullan received a partial athletic and academic

scholarship to Jacksonville along with Churchville-Chili's Bob King.

BRIGHTON All-American Stacy Prey won't compete in the 1,500 meter run this weekend at the state meet. Prey, the 1,500 and 3,000 meter sectional record holder, wants to concentrate on her specialty, the 3,000, and Brighton's 3,200 relay.

Rich's pitching blood lines run even deeper. His dad George pitched for Irondequoit in the late 1950s. A catcher at the time was Irondequoit Coach Ken

Rich Smith has been nothing short of amazing this spring. The Maryland-bound lefty has 145 strikeouts in 84 innings and an ERA of 0.63. He has pitched all of the Indians' playoff games.

"I'll never pitch a kid unless he's feeling good," Slater said. "The spacing of games has been great for Rich. Besides, he doesn't throw that many pitches

Smith will need to be at the top of his game against Gates Chili. Coach Tom McManis' team is in the finals for the third time in four years after upsetting top-seeded Aquinas 9-3 in the semis. The Spartans have not won the title since 1968.

ER starts just four seniors. "It was just a matter of the juniors coming of age," Coach Ron Rucker said of his team's post-season success.

□ AFTER FINISHING tied for 12th in the state golf championships as a sophomore, East Rochester's Mike Urzetta was looking forward to a big junior year. It never came.

Mike fired an 83 in the 1984 Section 5 championships at Clifton Springs and missed the cut for the state tournament.

"It was a real letdown." Urzetta said. "It's frustrating when you know you didn't play your best.'

This spring has been different. Urzetta has been among the area's most consistent players. He fired a 78 in the sectionals at the Country Club of Rochester to qualify fourth for Sunday's and Monday's state tournament at Cornell University.

Urzetta joins Brighton's Doug Bush, Midlakes' John DeRidder and Geneseo's Sherman Yates, tri-sectional champs at 76, as top seeds on the nineman Section 5 team.

"I'd like a Top 10 finish," Urzetta said. "But you have to go for it. I have a shot at winning if I play to the best of my ability.

Urzetta competed in his first tournament when he was 10. He comes from a golfing family. His father Sam and uncles Fred and Babe are all teaching pros. His dad, the pro at CCR, has been a big help.

"He's fantastic because if I ask him for help. he gives it and if I don't ask, he leaves me alone," Mike said. "He knows I have to learn on my own some-

Urzetta plans on playing in college at Eastern Kentucky.
