Sets Sec. 5 record in 800-meter run

McQuaid's Brad Sumner won the 800meter final in a Section 5 record time of 1 minute and 50.76 seconds yesterday at the Keebler International Prep Invitational track meet at Elmhurst, Ill.

The victory is the first for a Section 5 competitor in the Keebler meet, or the Golden West Invitational in Sacramento,

McQuaid's Chris Horton finished second in the mile in the Golden West Invitational in 1973 and Grant Whitney of Penfield finished second in the 3,200 in the Keebler meet in 1982.

"I was happy to win," said Sumner by telephone. "It wasn't a good day, though, to run a sub 1:50."

Sumner broke his previous sectional record of 1:51.05 in the 800.

Jason Drake of Wyandot High in Casper, Wyo., finished second in 1:51.82 and Anthony Williams of Horace Mann in Gary, Ind., was third in 1:52.30. Nine runners competed. There were no heats.

"It was a very, very impressive win against a very strong field," said McQuaid Coach Bob Bradley by telephone.

"They were all top runners," added Sumner. "This is the strongest 800 in which I've run. The leaders went out fast, under :26 on the first 200 meters. I held back slightly (:26.3 in the first 200 meters)."

Sumner was third after 200 meters, but starting moving toward the lead as the race neared 400 meters. On the second to last lap, Sumner caught up with race leader Chris Scott of Crossett, Ariz. The two stayed together until Sumner moved into the lead by two meters on the back straightaway, with 200 meters remaining.

Sumner then pulled away over the last 100 meters and withstood a mild challenge by Drake, said Bradley. Sumner's 400-meter splits were :54.7 and :56.0.

"I didn't see Drake coming up behind me," Sumner added.

The International Prep is regarded as one of the most significant high school meets in the country. Rick Glenhill of Chippewa Valley, Mich., won the 800 there last year in 1:49.33, the fastest high school time in the nation for the season.

The national record in the 800 was set in 1987 by George Kersh of Pearl, Miss, who ran 1:46.58.

Sumner won the individual 800 and anchored the McQuaid 3,200-meter relay a
