Just Call It McQuaid's Baby

The funny part, laughs Bob Bradley, is that his McQuaid two-mile relay team hasn't even qualified yet for the state track meet officially. In reality, though, the Knights have the best time in the state this season.

"Don't put the kiss of death on us," Bradley joked as his brilliant quartet of Tom Lott, John Farrell, Tim Lawrence and Tom Horton prepared for Saturday's Section 5 Meet at Brockport. "We still have to qualify for states."

That little formality should be taken care of with dispatch. After turning in a state-low 7:49.2 last Saturday at the Eddy Games in Schenectady, McQuaid is 21 seconds ahead of its closest Section 5 competition.

This Sectional business is a bit like making Isaac Stern audition with the other violinists for the high school orchestra. But rules are rules. However, despite Bradley's caution, it would probably be easier pole vaulting over Xerox Tower than trying to catch the Knights in this weekend's event.

The 7:49.2 is a New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) record. It is not, however, the fastest two-mile relay time ever record in the Empire State.

That would be the 7:35.6 of Andrew Jackson High School (Queens) set in 1966. The Jacks also

the national record, but the school was not a member of the state association. Neither was Power Memorial of New York who turned in a 7:40.8, the Catholic High School Association record.

"We don't want to run around and claim that we have THE state record," emphasized Bradley, "because we don't. We have the association record. Still I'm pleased because our times keep coming down and that must happen if we want to win the state championship."

Lott and Horton are jun-

iors; Lawrence and Farrell seniors. They ran cross country together and then teamed up in the two-mile relay six times during the winter, winning the state indoor title.

"Outdoors is the one they really want," Bradley asserted.

They have been matched three times outside. They won the Queens-Iona meet early in the season in 7:55.8 and finished fourth in late April at the Penn Relays in 7:51.2. That had been the Section 5 record before last Saturday.

The latest Knight time

broke by 1.4 seconds the old association record set in last year's state meet by Suffern, Rockland County. It was Suffern, you may recall, who beat McQuaid by two seconds in the state finals.

"It was a real fast track," pointed out Bradley, referring to Saturday's Eddy meet. "Four meet records were broken. The weather was ideal for short distances, but I thought the heat would hurt us in the longer distances. It didn't."

"I was most pleased by the fact they ran that time without much competition. I

expected a lot of the down-state powers to be there, but they had conflicts with their own Sectional meets."

Breaking down the record by legs, Lott started with a 1:58.7, Farrell came on with a 1:58.2, Lawrence added a 1:56.1 and Horton anchored with his fastest ever 1:56.2.

"This should give us a shot at 7:45 on Tuesday when we compete in the Eastern States Interscholastics at Randall's Island," said Bradley. "The strongest two-mile relay teams in this part of the country will be there. We'll have to do better than 7:49 to win that."

McQuaid won't be looking past the sectionals to that big Eastern meet. It's no secret Bradley would love to win the Section 5 team title and will even thin out his two-mile relay team to do it.

"I'll have Horton out so he can run the 440 and 880," he confessed. "I may even take out another man depending on how the meet is going. Last year we got away with it when Lawrence was pulled for other events." The bet here is they'll get away with it again.

best in the area behind McQuaid.

A newly-composed mile relay team of juniors Steve Kaiser and Scott Daggs and seniors Craig Cameron and Kurt Rodas clocked the Section's best time of 3:27.4. Kaiser had run a 10.1 in the 100 and 22.3 in the 220, while Daggs had done a 50.7 in the 440, but they were both pulled for the relay. It was their first time together.

NOTES: Mooney's Neil Moore ran an area best of 50.2 in the 440 at Eddy Games.

Sutherland's Pete Pfitzinger broke the three-year-old County record for the two-mile, winning in 9:24.4. He is expected to go head-to-head with Fairport's Dan Predmore (9:29.2) on Saturday. Junior Tom Beane of Arcadia only ran 120 high hurdles twice before qualifiers, but won in 14.8.

Tom Moore of R-H ran a 10-flat 100 and will go against

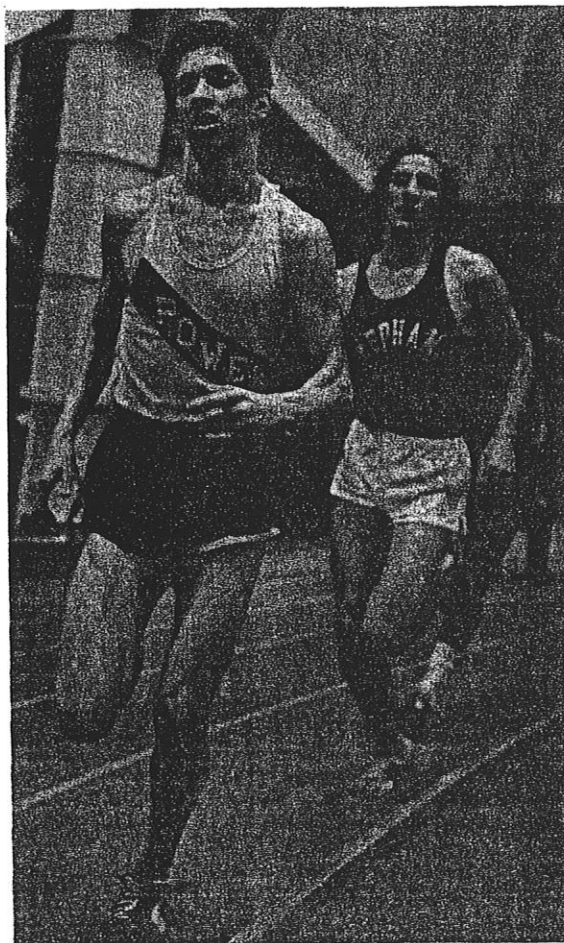
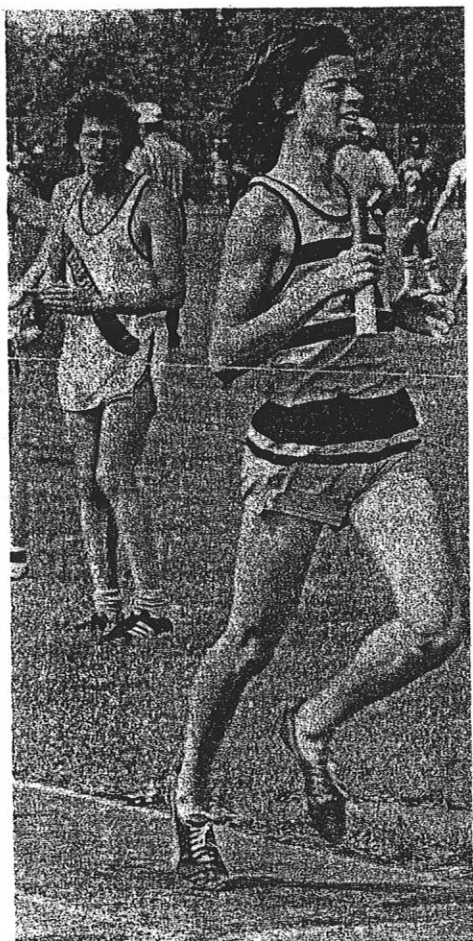

Selection Policy: The 10th annual NY State All-Star rankings, as always, are not based on how the Year-book feels the athletes would place in an idealized competition. Rather, the selections are based on the level of accomplishment: victories, competitive record, consistency, outstanding marks, with emphasis on league championship meets. Generally, dual meets receive little emphasis.

Explanation Of Selections:

100: Thomas solid. Consistent Broughton, Intersectional winner, beating Strothers, Eastern victor.
220: Thomas again. Jones, PSAL and Loucks runnerup (behind Thomas), edges I-S champ Atkins.
440: Carter's superior Golden West race gives him nod over Morris. Hollingsworth, with two 49.0's and a 48.9 LIAC win, narrow choice over Van Buren's Sobers, PSAL runnerup (behind Carter), and Mt. Vernon's Kirkland, solid before I-S weak showing.
880: Paige. DiRienzo and Stafford rough choice over Sawney, state leader at 1:51.5. DiR beat Stafford and Sawney in NY Relays, won sectional, league (over Stafford) and State Catholics. Stafford was ahead of Sawney in Loucks and Golden West and won sectional. Sawney suffered losses in Hartford, PSAL and Easterns, losing the latter two to rising Severino of Washington.
Mile: Paige solid again. Weaver won hot NY Relays race plus section, league and State Cath. titles. Crooke consistent, topped by 4:14.2 LIAC win to tie Loughlin's Ostolozaga, who left the mile after 4:14.3 seconds in the NYR and Loucks races.
2M: A peculiar cast. Weaver ran mainly miles after a junior-record 9:05.4(4th) in Loucks and before an Eastern runnerup. Crooke, 9:05 at Loucks, also split with mile duty and DNF'ed the Int'l 2M. Dobrzynski was consistent and made up for his loss in the I-S with a super 14:03.6 second in the Golden West. The architect of that State loss was Friedfeld. (The GW race was at 3M.)
HH: Willie unbeaten with Penn and I-S wins plus 3 14-flat's. Berich lost only to Willis and then to NJ'S Gonzalez in the Easterns. Clark, who beat Tech's Hurst in the PSAL, gets the nod over the indoor leader, injured after an early-season 13.9 (beating Clark). Dutweiler, 13.9, not nearly as sharp in the States.
IH: Clark and Murphy virtually even going to Golden West when Clark tipped and DNF'd as Murphy grabbed third. Willis solid for third.
Walks: Multi-victor Casarella, who topped Murchie in record-filled Loucks race, nips his friend and rival. Andrews, strong in post-season AAU events, gets third.
Steeple: Shields made up for Loucks setback with CHSAA triumph and jr-mark 9:23 in AAU Jrs. McNulty and Leary easy pickins for next slots.
HJ: Reavis. Parker and Hubbard both consistent with good performances. No one else close.
PV: Schneider, with many titles, the choice over Arietta, I-S winner and Eastern runnerup. Haff solid in third with 14-7 Farmer (Kenmore W) too inconsistent for consideration.

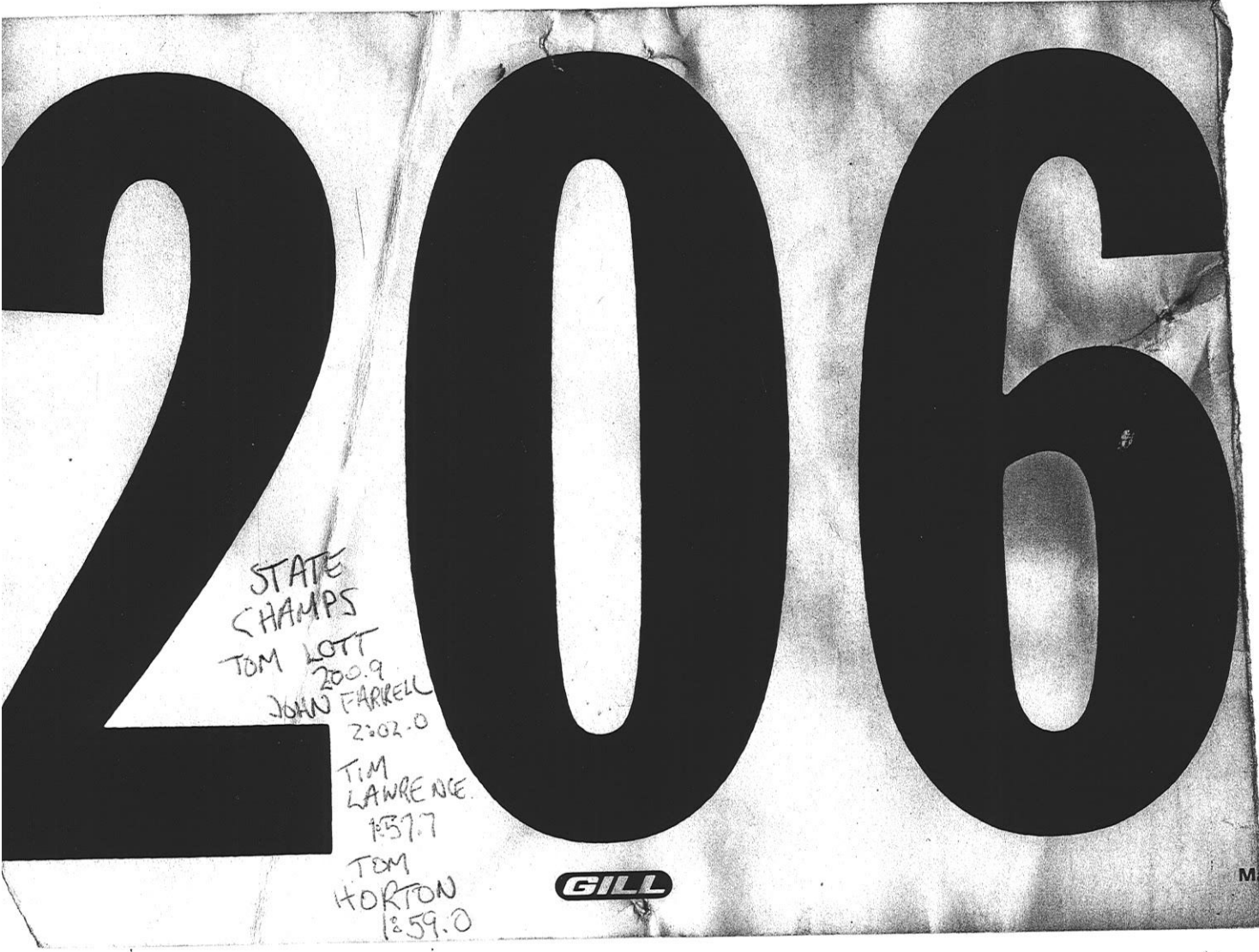

McQuaid sets state record

MORRISVILLE — The only way the McQuaid two-mile relay team has been stopped this season has been by a heavy rain that postponed last week's Eastern States Interscholastic Championships.

A light rain and the state's best competition were no match for the Knights' foursome of Tom Lott, Tim Lawrence, John Farrell and Tom Horton yesterday in the state meet at Morrisville Tech.

The McQuaid team romped to a victory in the state record time of seven minutes, 48.2 seconds, beating its previous mark of 7:49.2 in the only victory of the day for Section 5 competitors.

McQuaid relay team wins title, sets record

ITHACA — McQuaid's two-mile relay team became the first Section 5 team, to win an event and set meet and state records in the fourth New York State indoor track and field meet yesterday at Cornell University.

The Knights' team of junior Tom Lott, senior John Farrell, senior Tim Lawrence and junior Tom Horton won in seven minutes, 59.6 seconds to give Section 5 its first winner in three years of competing in the meet.

Lawrence ran a 1:57.7 leg and Horton, anchoring the team finished in 1:59.0 to boost McQuaid to a close victory over New Rochelle of Section 1 (8:00.8). McQuaid edged New Rochelle in the Eastern Interscholastic Meet Monday night, running a 7:54.7, the second fastest time nationally. McQuaid's team was second in that race to Maria Regina of Long Island, which won in 7:52.2.

Nanset of Section 9 was third in 8:00.9. The previous meet mark was 8:06.2 by Ithaca (1972) and the previous

state indoor mark was 8:00.5 by Pleasantville last year.

Horton led by 10 yards going into the final leg, was challenged by New Rochelle and Nanset and then pulled away in the last lap.

McQuaid's victory helped Section 5 finish sixth out of nine sections. Section 1 won with 65 points.

John Bodensteiner of Bishop Kearney had the best individual finish for Section 5, coming in fourth in the 300-yard run (33.4 seconds), the best indoor time in Section 5 this season.

Tom Ormsby of Rush-Henrietta and Hal Fairbanks of Penfield tied for fourth in the pole vault (12 feet, six inches).

John Tuttle of Alfred-Almond, a sophomore, was fifth in the 200-yard run (2:18.), the fastest Section 5 time this season. Tuttle was fifth despite running in the consolation section of the race.

Section 5's intersectional relay team of Rick Stacy, Hilton, Chris Downes, Monroe, Joe Chimera, Bishop Kearney, and Joe Brett, Aquinas, was fifth.
